Online Learning Comes to PPHS

Who would've thought a high school course could be taught online? Apparently Palisades Park! Palisades Park High School now offers an online French III course. This class is for juniors that have completed French I and French II. Currently, there are seven students enrolled in the course.

The class is run through a company called Edmentum. The Palisades Park Board Of Education decided to offer this course to ensure students could get three years of education in French.

"We decided to offer this course because it is a graduation requirement to take a foreign language course for two years, but it would look good on your college resume if you take one language for three years, and also because
